most beloved seniors. It was the real emulsion of enthralling young Ryanites and an ever charming gamut of memories that passing students carved throughout their school life.


The gathering was addressed by ceo Ryan who ad-

Basava students make provisional discovery of asteroids

Uma Gaba and Palak Mathur of class XI, Basava International School, Dwarka were given the coveted opportunity to represent the school for the All India Asteroid Search Campaign (AIASC) 2021. Furthermore, they were one of the few to make a provisional discovery of an asteroid. AIASC 2021, an outreach campaign organised by Space India enables Indian students and amateur astronomers to get an exclusive access to astronomy images and training is imparted in advanced data analysis and software to search asteroids in the main belt asteroid. These citizen scientists are able to make original astronomical discoveries, in-



teract with international scientists and participate in hands-on astronomical events/processes. Discoveries with provisional status are maintained in the Minor Planet Centre (MPC) database until there have been a sufficient number of observations to fully determine the orbit.

The students said that AIASC is an exclusive international platform for anyone who has an interest in astronomy, to get exposure in the field and also make a contribution to the society. This was irrefutably an invaluable experience for them. Under the aegis of AIASC mentors, the students were able to augment their knowledge about space and asteroids.

NZEALAND CRUSH INDIA

Bowling a concern before WC says a disappointed Mithali Raj after fourth ODI loss to NZ

The Indian women's cricket team's horror tour of New Zealand continued as the White Ferns demolished the visitors by 63 runs in a rain-curtailed fourth WODI on Tuesday to inch towards a clean sweep in the five-match series here. The game became a glorified 'T20' due to rain as Amelia Kerr stole the show with a 33-ball-68 which took New Zealand to 191 for 5. Amelia, one half of the famous Kerr sisters, then mopped up the tail with 3 for 30 as India managed only 128 before being all-out in 17.5 overs.

COMPLETE DOWN SLIDE

Teenager Richa Ghosh's counter-attacking 52 off 29 balls was the only silver lining in an otherwise disastrous performance which has now led to five defeats on this tour including the one-off T20.

The bowling performance of the Indians seemed to have nose-dived with each passing game and it was the worst on Tuesday where only Rajeshwari Gayakwad (4-0-26-1) looked the part. Meghna Singh (1/45 in 4 overs) and Deepthi Sharma (1/49 in 4 overs) were two bowlers taken to the cleaners by Amelia who had 11 fours and a six in her kitty.

New Zealand started on a rousing note with a 53-run opening stand between Sophie Devine (32 of 24 balls) and Suzie Bates (41 off 26 balls). Once the platform was laid, Amelia and Amy Satterthwaite (32 off 16 balls) literally pummeled the Indian bowling.

A chase of 192 was always going to be a tough ask even though the out of form Harmanpreet Kaur



It was another complete performance from us. With the bat, we showed real intent. Good experience (shortened game) with the World Cup coming up. It was a great opportunity for us. The batters played to their strengths and 191 was probably above-par. The fielding is an area where we've missed a few, that's an area where we can probably save another 10-15 runs.
New Zealand skipper SOPHIE DEVINE

was dropped from the playing eleven. Smriti Mandhana very understandably was out of rhythm after a long and hard quarantine and youngsters Shafali Verma (0) and Yastika Bhatia (0) were out in quick succession. The match was as good as over by the fifth over when India were reduced to 19 for 4. Richa and Mithali Raj (30 off 28 balls) added 67 runs but it was in a lost cause as wickets fell at regular interval.

Amelia's sister Jess also got two wickets upfront while Francis Mackay and Heley Jensen shared the spoils with two and three wickets respectively.

The only time India had something to cheer about was when Richa clobbered the White Ferns bowlers for four huge sixes and four boundaries while Mithali played the second fiddle. Once Richa was gone, the stomach for fight wasn't evident in others as six wickets fell for 32 runs.

India skipper Mithali Raj expressed disappointment after her side was beaten. "We have definitely been trying few compositions with our spin and seam attack. But to be honest the bowling is a bit of concern before the World Cup. We want all our main bowlers to get their rhythm," said Mithali after the game.

"We are adapting to the conditions. There are spells where the bowlers have bowled well but we are not consistent and it is something that we are looking to improve. I was just looking at the shots and the way she (Richa) went about her batting, she is very talented and the future for India," she added.

TRAINING PAYS OFF

Amelia Kerr expressed happiness after her breakthrough knock helped the White Ferns in defeating India. New Zealand skipper Sophie Devine praised the batters for playing to their strengths. "With the bowling, at times, we have been slow to change our plans. We have to adapt quicker. I had belief in this group forever, nice to see people are seeing that. We are seeing the results now, there's real confidence and belief. It's perfect timing with the World Cup just around the corner," she said.

With this win, New Zealand has gained a 4-0 lead in the five-match series. The final ODI will now be played on Thursday. Time is running out for coach Ramesh Powar as only two weeks are left for World Cup to start and it is not at all looking good for the team. AGENCIES



INDIA GO WITH TRIED AND TESTED

Sukhjeet the new face in two-legged FIH Pro League tie against Spain

Promising forward Sukhjeet Singh was the new face in India's 20-strong men's hockey squad announced on Tuesday for the FIH Pro League tie against Spain at the Kalinga Stadium in Bhubaneswar later this week. The two-leg tie will be held on February 26 and 27 and the Olympic bronze medallist Indian team will be led by Manpreet Singh. Dragflick specialist Harmanpreet Singh will serve as Manpreet's deputy.

The Indian team will see a new face in 25-year-old Sukhjeet from Punjab, who was picked in the core group following an impressive stint during the maiden Hockey India Inter-Department National Championship last year.

"We have chosen a balanced group to play Spain for this weekend and are looking forward to playing at home in Bhubaneswar," chief coach Graham Reid said. "It includes another new debutant striker Sukhjeet Singh who impressed during the selection camp last month and has been

"Spain has a new coach and will be keen to impress after losing to England. These games are an important step in preparation for what is a very busy year," Reid added. "We are not too concerned about the losses against England. We have just started, we've played only two matches, so I wouldn't put too much emphasis on winning or losing yet. We were really competitive in our opening matches, and will try to play our brand of hockey against India," Spain head coach Max Caldas said.

Spain captain Marc Miralles said they are well prepared to give India a run for their money in the upcoming matches. The Indian team has won three out of the four matches in the FIH Pro League. The team will be playing the first home matches this season. PTI

STRANDJA: NITU, ANAMIKA THROUGH TO QUARTERS

Indian women boxers Nitu (48kg) and Anamika (50kg) advanced to the quarterfinals of the 73rd Strandja Memorial Tournament in Sofia, Bulgaria, after clinching impressive opening-round wins.

Nitu outpunched Russia's Chumgalakova Luliia 5-0, and

will now take on Italy's Roberta Bonatti. Anamika defeated local hope Chukanova Zlatislava 4-1 to make the last-eight stage on Monday. She will next face Algeria's Roumaysa Boualem.

However, Shiksha (54kg) and Akash (67kg) lost their respective bouts to bow out of contention. While Shiksha lost to Kazakhstan's former world champion and reigning Asian gold-medallist Dina Zholaman, Akash was bested by Germany's Deniel Krotter. Both of them lost by an identical 0-5 margin.

Youth world champion Arundhati Choudhary (71kg), national champion Rohit Mor (57kg) and six other Indian boxers are set to begin their campaign.

The tournament features over 450 boxers from 36 countries, including traditional powerhouses such as Kazakhstan, Italy, Russia and France. PTI
