Indulge in some embroidery work

I am doing some embroidery work and I'll show you how I did my recent work. I made a small table cloth. You can do embroidery work on handkerchiefs, cushion covers, any fabric and frame them into wall hangers.

You need embroidery thread, embroidery frame, satin ribbon, needle, scissors and tracing paper.

Let's get started. First, attach the fabric to the embroidery frame. Choose an attractive image and trace it on the fabric.

I drew the image of a doll. Pleat the satin ribbon into a layered skirt and hem it on the cloth. With a woolen thread, do long stitches to make the hair. Stitch a few green and pink French knots on the hair to form flowers.

Make a bow with the satin ribbon and stitch it on the frock. You can stitch some

flowers, leaves and French knots to give a border. It is

now ready for use.

CSK TO PLAY FOR SURVIVAL, MI FOR PRIDE

CHENNAI WILL BE ELIMINATED IF THEY LOSE TO MUMBAI

Their IPL play-off hopes hanging by a thread, Chennai Super Kings will face their fiercest rivals, a down and out Mumbai Indians, in their bid to stay afloat in the competition on Thursday. This has been a season to forget for both Mumbai and CSK. While Mumbai will be playing for pride, CSK still have an outside chance to progress if they win their remaining games and other results go their way. CSK will be eliminated if they lose to Mumbai Indians at the Wankhede Stadium.

NEED AGGRESSIVE START

The M S Dhoni-led side would take confidence from their 91-run win over Delhi Capitals in their last outing and hope the batters build on their brilliant showing. Opener Devon Conway is in sublime form and has hit three back-to-back half centuries. He tore apart the

Delhi Capitals attack with his whirlwind 87 and would need to provide an aggressive start with fellow opener Ruturaj Gaikwad, who too has found form but can be more consistent. The season got worse for Ravindra Jadeja who was left out for the last game against Delhi due to an injury after handing back the captaincy to Dhoni. It remains


to be seen if he is back in action against Mumbai. If CSK have to post a big score, like they did against DC, all batters will have to fire in unison. Last time when the two sides met, a vintage Dhoni, 'the best finisher' sealed the game on the last ball of the game.

CSK bowlers were right on the money when they bundled DC for 117. Tweaker Moeen Ali picked three wickets, while young pacers Mukesh Choudhary and Simarjeet Singh also fared well. The trio will need to once again deliver along with key spinner Maheesh Theekshana, whose four overs can also change the game's fate. Another important cog is Bravo, who has the knack of breaking partnerships.

COMPLETE PERFORMANCE

For Mumbai, all the remaining games are 'dead rubbers' and they would need to give a 'complete performance' with an improved batting show. Skipper Rohit Sharma (200 runs) will need to lead from the front and Ishan Kishan (321 runs) can build on his half century in the last game. MI's middle order batters, which crumbled against KKR, will also need to get the act right. With Suryakumar Yadav ruled out, the likes of Tilak Varma, Tim David, Randeep Singh and Kieron Pollard, who has been a failure, will need to take greater responsibility.

In bowling, Bumrah found his mojo back and clinched a maiden five-wicket haul in IPL history. But he needs support from other bowlers - Daniel Sams, Riley Meredith and Kumar Kartikeya Singh, who will need to contain the CSK batters. While Mumbai would eye revenge, for Chennai the game is about "survival". AGENCIES

BETIS DEFEATS VALENCIA

CHAMPIONS LEAGUE HOPES ALIVE FOLLOWING 3-0 WIN

Real Betis defeated Valencia 3-0 in the Spanish league on Tuesday to end a four-match winless streak and keep alive its hopes of qualifying for the Champions League next season. It was a rematch of the Copa del Rey final won by Betis in a penalty shootout last month.

NEAR THE TOPMOST

Willian José, Sergio Canales and Borja Iglesias scored a goal each in the second half to move Betis within three points of fourth place Atlético Madrid, which visits Elche on Wednesday. Betis is four points behind city rival Sevilla, which hosts relegation-threatened Mallorca on Wednesday. There will be two rounds left after the mid-week games are completed. Manuel Pellegrini's Betis had been near the topmost of the season but lost ground recently as it focused on the final stages of the Copa del Rey. It was coming off two losses

GRANADA WINS AGAIN

- Granada defeated mid-table Athletic Bilbao 1-0 to move five points from the relegation zone ahead of the other mid-week games.
- Álex Collado scored a 35th-minute winner for 16th-place Granada, which was coming off a 6-2 victory at 18th-place Mallorca.
- Granada is unbeaten in four matches, since a 4-1 home loss to Levante in April.
- Eighth-place Athletic played a man down from the 85th after Mikel Vesga was sent off with a second yellow card.

and two draws in its last four league matches, including a 2-1 home defeat against Barcelona after conceding four minutes into stoppage time.

MATHEMATICAL CHANCE

Betis last played in the Champions League in 2005-06, after it finished fourth in the Spanish league. It ended sixth in the league in two of the last four seasons, with its lone title coming in 1934-35. "While there is still a mathematical chance, we have to keep believing," Pellegrini said. "All we can do is win our last two matches, even though we know it will be difficult for the other teams to lose points." Second-place Barcelona later Tuesday hosts Celta Vigo to try to secure second place and a berth in the Spanish Super Cup. The Catalan club is four points in front of third-place Sevilla. Granada, two points from safety, tries to move further away from the relegation zone when it hosts eighth-place Athletic Bilbao. AP

INDIA LOSE TO SOUTH KOREA 5-0 IN FINAL GROUP CLASH

After registering two back-to-back wins, Team India crashed 5-0 against South Korea in their final group clash of the ongoing Uber Cup 2022 in Bangkok, on Wednesday.

In the Group D match, World No. 7 PV Sindhu fell prey to An Se-young, as she got completely dominated in both the games. Sindhu lost in her outing by 15-21, 14-21, in a match that lasted 42 minutes.

In the second clash, the women's doubles pair of Shruti Mishra and Simran Singh got thrashed by Lee So-hee and Shin Seung-chan 13-21, 12-21, in a 39-minute match. Locked horns with Kim Ga-Eun in the third match and got outplayed by 10-21, 10-21.

Then, the duo of Tanisha Crasto and Treasa Jolly lost to Kim Hye-jeong and Kong Hee-

yong, 14-21, 11-21, in a match that lasted for 36 minutes. In the final clash, Ashmita Chaliha went against Sim Yu-jin but India's losing streak continued as she ended the game at 18-21, 17-21. Earlier, Team India had convincingly won against Canada and USA and reserved their place in the quarterfinals of the ongoing Uber Cup 2022. ANI


